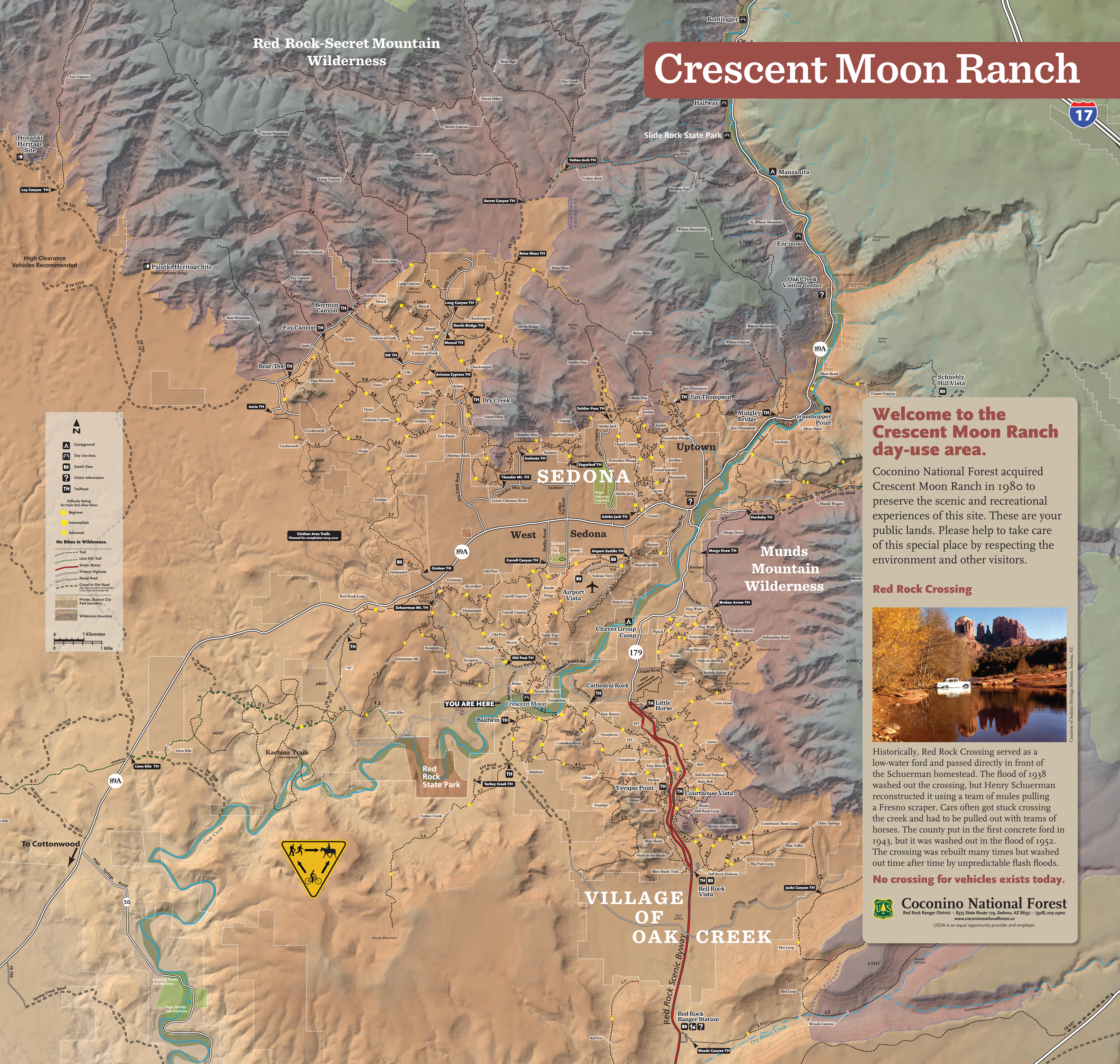


# Crescent Moon Ranch

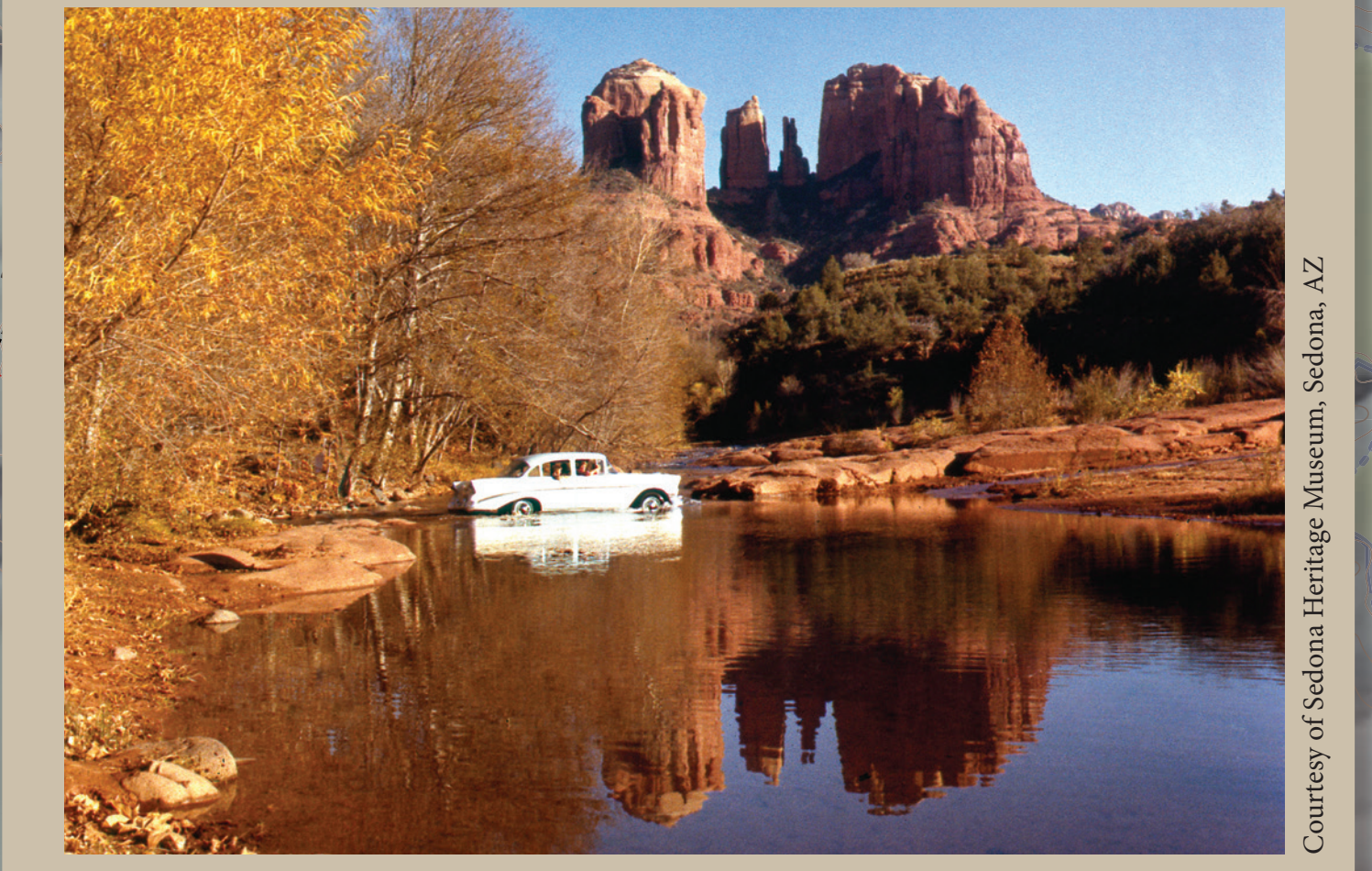

Coconino National Forest acquired Crescent Moon Ranch in 1980 to preserve the scenic and recreational experiences of this site. These are your public lands. Please help to take care of this special place by respecting the environment and other visitors.

### Red Rock Crossing



Historically, Red Rock Crossing served as a low-water ford and passed directly in front of the Schuerman homestead. The flood of 1938 washed out the crossing, but Henry Schuerman reconstructed it using a team of mules pulling a Fresno scraper. Cars often got stuck crossing the creek and had to be pulled out with teams of horses. The county put in the first concrete ford in 1943, but it was washed out in the flood of 1952. The crossing was rebuilt many times but washed out time after time by unpredictable flash floods.
