Know Before You Go. Plan ahead for your trek, whether it is on foot, bike, or horseback. Be sure you are physically fit for the trip and know your route. Pack appropriately for the weather and take plenty of water.

Stick To Trails. Damage to the biological soil crust takes 70 to 125 years to grow back. Prevent erosion and avoid damaging sensitive plants and organisms by staying on designated trails.


Trash Your Trash. Pack out and dispose of any trash properly. Even “natural” waste, such as apple cores and orange peels, should be carried out. Pick up after your pet; thousands of pounds of dog feces contribute to *E. coli* bacteria in Oak Creek each year.

Leave It As You Find It. Leave plants, rocks, animals, and artifacts where you find them so that others can enjoy the discovery as well.

Keep Wildlife Wild. Observe from a distance. Never feed wild animals or throw rocks or other objects at them. Keep pets on a leash.

Home to Rare Snakes

Two species of nonvenomous gartersnakes live near Oak Creek, where they hunt small fish. The **northern Mexican gartersnake** occurs here in the lower reaches of Oak Creek. The **narrow-headed gartersnake** lives upstream in Oak Creek Canyon as one of the last populations of its species in Arizona. It is against the law to harass, handle, hurt, or kill these rare reptiles. Stay on designated trails to avoid harming their streamside habitat.

El Hogar de Culebras Poco Comunes

Dos especies de culebras *garter* no venenosas viven cerca de Oak Creek, donde ellas cazan peces pequeños. La **culebra garter mexicana norteña** (“northern Mexican gartersnake” en inglés) se encuentra en la parte baja de Oak Creek. La **culebra garter de cabeza angosta** (“narrow-headed gartersnake” en inglés) vive río arriba en el Cañón Oak Creek como una de las últimas poblaciones de su especie en Arizona. Es contra la ley molestar, recoger, herir o matar estos réptiles poco comunes. Manténgase en los senderos señalados para no dañar su hábitat ribereño.
